Articles

Articles must be related to current research or recent developments in the sciences and can take the form of a research, opinion, or review piece. Research articles should focus on the applicability of your research, methods, results, and conclusions (or hypotheses).

Proposals

To be considered for publication, authors must submit an abstract (for research articles) or article proposals (for opinion and review articles) of no longer than one page. The proposal should be clearly written and provide a concise description of what you'd like to write about. Please include the following items in a document titled "[Last Name] – Synapse Proposal":

- Abstract Cover Page (research articles, found on <http://people.bu.edu/science>)
- Header (see formatting below)
- Title of Article
- Introduction/Background
- Methods and Conclusions (research articles)
- How you would make the article interesting for our audience to read
- References (APA formatting)

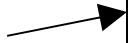
